***WHEREAS**, mental health is essential to the overall health and well-being of every individual; and*

***WHEREAS**, all individuals experience times of difficulty and stress in their lives; and*

***WHEREAS**, one in five American adults will have a diagnosable mental health condition in any given year; and*

***WHEREAS**, fifty percent of Americans will meet the criteria for a diagnosable mental health condition sometime in their life, and half of those people will develop conditions by the age of 14; and*

***WHEREAS**, prevention is a known and effective way to treat and address many mental health conditions; and*

***WHEREAS**, there is a strong body of research that supports specific methodology that people of all ages can use to better handle challenges, stress and crisis in order to protect their health and well-being; and*

***WHEREAS**, mental health conditions are real and prevalent in our community, especially those conditions that are likely to result in severe depression or suicide and*

***WHEREAS**, recent studies indicate that the incidence of suicide in Camden County is occurring at an alarming rate, and*

WHEREAS, with early and effective treatment, affected individuals with mental health conditions can recover and lead full, productive lives; and

Public Comments

Satilla Riverkeeper Ashby Nix, Woodbine

Ms. Nix presented a PowerPoint presentation to the Board regarding the proposed Palmetto Pipeline project:

Private property

- Applied for GA DOT permit for “public necessity and convenience”, i.e. the right to use eminent domain to condemn private property
- This right is reserved for public project such as roads, power lines, schools, etc. that provide public goods, services, benefits
- Landowners continue to pay taxes on property, and this decreases their property potential and value.
- Lots of questions regarding liability for landowners
 - landowner must get approval to cross line
 - Cannot grow trees or timber on property
 - 4-wheeler, tractor or truck damage to pipeline
 - illegal hunting/trespassers
 - Landowners must purchase grates to cross path safely

Safety

- Statistics show a spill or leak from a pipeline each day in the U.S.
- Not regulated under FERC, instead state regulate
- Kinder Morgan’s Plantation Pipeline leaked 300,000 gallons (8,000 barrels) in Belton S.C. in Dec 2014 from an undetected leak. Still cleaning this up today!
- What is the landowners and counties liability for these occurrences, when, not if, they occur?
- What does a spill look like in our county?

Environment

- Crosses Georgia’s 5 major coastal rivers: Savannah, Ogeechee, Altamaha, Satilla and St. Marys.
- Crosses countless wetlands, tidal freshwater marshes and coastal swamps
- 167,000 barrels is equal to 700 tanker trucks
- Implications for our rivers, coastal communities, tourism and fisheries based economy?
- Risks are clear, benefits are not

Benefits to Camden County?

- Decreases property value
- Few, if any, jobs
- Cannot guarantee if product will lower gas prices due to competition
- Unclear on tax benefit amounts, calculations for county
- Places our resources and private properties at risk.
- Potential for export at Georgians expense
- Lack of transparency, unclear of route of pipeline
- Have not sufficiently shown need for pipeline or benefits to Camden

Protect our private properties, state waters and communities

Please ask GA DOT to deny permit to use eminent domain for private profit without clear benefits to Georgians

- Reconsider resolution opposing use of eminent domain for project using private property for private profit
- Attend May 7th public hearing in Waynesboro
- Submit public comment to GA DOT Commissioner Russel McMurray by May 15th - Rmcmurry@dot.ga.gov
- Sign online petition or visit “Bike Lines against Palmetto Pipeline” in Brunswick May 13th

GA DOT decision on use of eminent domain will be made by May 19th otherwise automatically granted!

Dean Worley, St. Marys River Management Committee

Mr. Worley thanked the Board for the recognition and praised the members of the St. Marys River Management Committee for all their hard work with raising community awareness as well as organizing clean-up efforts for our rivers.

Wayne Golliday, St. Marys

Mr. Golliday stated that the Palmetto Pipeline project has benefits and there are numerous safety protocols in place to prevent disasters from happening. He spoke against statements made in the PowerPoint previously presented.

Ben Casey, Kingsland

Mr. Casey stated that the Palmetto Pipeline Project will connect to the port in Jacksonville, Florida where the company already operates and has employees. He explained that the pipeline will bring little to no jobs to Georgians and few benefits to our State.
